# **Prompts for Reflection**



Our minds are often primed to settle into binaries. In battles and wars the dividing lines are winners and losers, victors and vanquished. But in life we know it is more complicated. Most of the time the demarcation is not that neat. In war, moreover, there is a net loss, an irreparable loss, and all suffer it because even for the winners, the victors, there is a profound sense that we have done something awful from which we may never recover. There is, it seems, an innate aversion to killing another, to taking their life, and in the circumstances of war, that killing can take on a deformed aspect, bodies dismembered, torn, burnt, evaporated. For this reason, even the supposed victors find it hard to speak of it afterwards. Even if they do speak, their consciousness may be racked by unresolved guilt. As one writer put it: the sword defiles whether it is at its point or at its hilt, both the one who wields it and the one who is slain are deformed. This is not to equalize what has happened, how can we? But it is to say that no one remains unscathed.
