To worship God, grow as Jesus' disciples, care for one another, and take God's love to the world.

Joy may be the last thing we are thinking about, even though we are approaching a time of the year when such is what we are looking forward to: "good news of great joy" (Luke 2:10)! We may feel guilt even at the possibility of anticipating or expecting joy, when so much anguish is playing out on our daily news. Our heart breaks and is far from joy. Is it then possible to open ourselves to God's abiding joy? Even in the shadows of devastation, trauma, or spiritual deficit?



I think the answer may be "yes."

Preceding the "good news of great joy" is this angelic assurance: "do not be afraid." Pierre Teilhard de Chardain, French theologian and scientist, has said that "Joy is the infallible sign of the presence of God." This is anything but forcing "happiness." It is rather opening our soul, even if it is a frightened fraction of our soul, to the vibrating energy which is the healing balm, the strength in weakness, which we do not and cannot manufacture but only receive as beggars receive food. Joy is not dependent on circumstance, if it was, it can come and go. So, I think our scriptures point to something else, indeed—to some-one.

The key which unlocks the possibility of joy is not circumstance but a person — to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord (Luke 2:11). So, joy comes to us when it is most needed. God has been present, can be present, even in foxholes and hellholes. This is not the same as ignorance, not the same as denial, rather it is precious connection to faith and hope that the world as it is, is not as it should be or will be forever. Because at least once in a moment of time, the divine love broke into our world, in its sadness, in its heartbreak, in its despair, and because this is the divine life, it is eternal life, life which is stronger than death and manifesting a love which is stronger, must be stronger, than hate. The Christ is a moment of tender joy, daring to see through the thick fog of war, and suffering and crying to consolation and restoration. When we yearn for joy like water to the thirsty and bread to the hungry, we know it more deeply than circumstance when it does come. It is what we read not only in the gospel stories of Christ's birth, but also in the vision of the resurrected Christ at the end of time:

And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them;

⁴ he will wipe every tear from their eyes.

Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away.' (Revelation 21: 3-4).

Resource Management Committee Report

The year-to-date revenue, without the budgeted funds from Trustees, as of the end of September, was budgeted to be \$225,509. Actual monies received was \$200,841 leaving a shortfall of \$24,668. Expenses are under budget by \$39,336. In summary, revenues were budgeted to be short \$169,278 to this point in the year. Actual revenue is \$154,610 which is \$14,668 less than what was budgeted.

The Trustees were to give us \$45,000 which was received. The Trustees gave us an additional \$93,826 to meet our financial obligations. After this donation is counted, we have a \$15,784 deficit remaining.




Session Report

Central Presbyterian Church has much to celebrate at the start of Advent, and a new year in the Christian calendar; and as Elders we thank God for all the good work being done in our midst. We have had the wonderful opportunity to welcome some new faces, as well as some we may not have seen in a few years. On Reformation Sunday we welcomed nine new members, and in true Presbyterian fashion there was cake in the hall afterwards. Please take the opportunity at some point to welcome Emile, Tom, Solomon and Daina, Chidinma, Melodie, Olive, Marcus and Sharon.

We also have a growing Faith Finders program that needs additional support, a nursery that could use a couple of volunteers to give parents a chance to join worship (when there are more than 5 children). There are also enough teens that Sara and a few volunteers are looking to begin a mid-week youth program for the first time in nearly a decade.

The Session is now considering the ways we will continue to move forward. In this phase of Dr. Nick's work with us, Session is in the process of exploring every option open to us to determine how to ensure the flourishing of our ministries. We hope to thrive as a Christian community sharing in worship and fellowship,



but we also aim to offer and share our resources so that they are a blessing to the community around us. Our part in taking God's love to the world. As we get further on this path, we will be seeking your advice, support, and involvement at every step. Our initial exploration includes looking at options from transforming existing space into a community hub, working in ministry partnerships with other congregations, or even the possibility of development on or in our space. Any option we consider may involve transformational changes, and that belongs not to the Session alone, but to you – and to God.

In the meantime, we have a full year of interim ministry leadership before February of 2025. The Session has asked the Presbytery of Hamilton to appoint an Interim Moderator to form a Search Committee and begin the process of finding our next called minister. Beginning this process now may allow us to reduce, or even eliminate the length of time that we are without a full-time minister between the end of Dr. Nick's contract, and the start of our next minister. As Presbyterians, it is essential that our next minister is chosen and "called" by the congregation, hence the need to have an interim moderator appointed by the Presbytery for this work.

Luke's description of the early church in Acts highlights the Christians' commitment to service of and in their community in the name of Christ. Consider how you might be called to do just that at Central, and in the heart of Hamilton. Our committees (based on this description) need people to serve and support the work of our Worship, Discipleship, Fellowship and Mission. There are opportunities to help in leadership as well as enabling the every-day work of this community of faith. Perhaps you can find your place in the choir or the livestream crew, helping in the nursery or Faith Finders, bringing supplies

for coffee hour, coordinating our welcome at the door or even joining the ministry of Hamilton Out of the Cold. All are opportunities for us to give, and to be, the best we can in service to our Lord. Please consider offering your time, talents or resources. However much or little you think you can offer; it is more useful than you can imagine. As John Milton noted:

"God doth not need
Either man's work, or his own gifts: who best
Bear his mild yoke, they serve him best. His state
Is kingly; thousands at his bidding speed
And post o'er land and ocean without rest;
They also serve who only stand and wait."

Indigenous Circle of Friendship: Big Drums are Calling!



On September 23, 2023, the Social Justice Group of Central Presbyterian Church (Hamilton) hosted Coast Ts'msyen First Nation Elders **Shannon Thunderbird** and **Kate Dickson** for a learning event: "Indigenous Circle of Friendship: Big Drums are Calling!" Although Shannon and Kate are originally from the West Coast, they are based in Toronto. Central was blessed to engage in this work with passionate and experienced leaders, all in the spirit of reconciliation. This was an intergenerational event, with children and adults from the congregation present, as well as guests from the community.

Shannon and Kate's specialty is the use of music and original song. They became known to Central through children in the congregation. Spring 2023, a very special relationship was formed when these young people who worked with Shannon and Amgan ~Lik~lgaawks (Red Cedar Sisters) through the Hamilton Children's Choir. Inspired by their experience, the children sang two Haudenosaunee songs as part of our National Indigenous Peoples Day worship service in June 2023. Special permission from Shannon was granted to sing these songs in worship. During our September event, these amazing children stood up with Shannon and Kate, and sang some of the songs they learned together. It was a beautiful reunion, and a demonstration of friendship and affection that was meaningful for the event participants.

The morning included a discussion around the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and the 94 Calls to Action.

With children present, Shannon and Kate addressed residential schools with sensitivity. The experience helped to lift our connection into relationship. Ideas were shared by the presenters on how we can take steps towards reconciliation and be part of that partnership. Questions were freely answered with warmth, generosity, and humour.

The highlight of the morning was the drumming, call and response singing, and circle dancing around the big drum. Everyone was invited to participate in the drumming. The joy experienced in the room was palpable. We received wonderful feedback from those in attendance, expressing that it was an honour to sit around the drum with these inspiring elders, and to participate in this act of reconciliation.



The morning ended with a lunch hosted by the Social Justice Group. Central is grateful for the generosity of the PCC Healing and Reconciliation Seed Fund for their support of this event. - Submitted by Sara Traficante, Coordinator of Discipleship

The start of the season for Hamilton Out of the Cold was Thursday, November 2 at Central. Once again, the Central team will be alternating with Kathy Havill's team, meaning that each group provides a meal every second Thursday. We are using the take-out format again, as we find we have a greater reach by handing out meals for people to take home. Many of our guests pick up meals for others who are unable to come to the church to pick up the food. Two of the Hamilton Out of the Cold sites are going back to sit-down meals this season – Erskine Presbyterian Church on Saturdays, and Immanuel Christian Reformed Church on the mountain, on Monday evenings. We will see how it goes, and whether other sites wish to follow in the coming seasons.

We are happy to welcome back Alex Prince, Karen Martin, Judy Johnson, Diane Arrell, and Cathy Keith who have not been able to join us for a season or more. Two new members have joined our team – Louise Bush, and Chidinama Umezie. Our regular team is pretty much back although we said goodbye to Mikhail Mackenzie this season. Shirley Mighton, who has served with the Central Team from the beginning of the program at Central has moved to our "on call" list to fill in for absentees.

We served 142 meals to 67 guests the first Thursday in November. The hot dinner was Beef Cabbage Roll Casserole, plus raw vegetables with cottage cheese dip. Bread, apples, and granola bars finished the meal.

We have a new initiative starting this season. Beginning Monday, November 6th and continuing every Monday from 10:00 AM to 12:00 noon, a drop in café and warming centre will be running in our Fellowship Hall. Coffee, baked goods, hard boiled eggs cheese and fruit are available to our guests. The first café saw 14 guests come in and sit down for a visit and some refreshments.

We are very optimistic that this will provide a warm place and hospitality to our guests throughout the winter season. HOOTC Volunteer, Bonnie Roe is coordinating the cafes and has a team supporting her – Shannon Webster, Jim Matis, Doug Taylor, Sarah Ramond, Brian Paterson, and Wendy Leigh-Bell. We wish this team the best for a very successful season.

We have received some donations to the Central Out of the Cold fund and should be able to be self supporting until the New Year. We thank everyone who has donated to the HOOTC fund at Central.
