# Prompts for Reflection

There is no one sight and no one insight, we are a human multitude in place and time. But we are also individuals. By provoking issues and questions as forcefully as it does, the book of Job may lead us to self-discovery and, thereby, to knowledge of God far from the beaten path. Such a discovery may be painful. *Word of the Day: I was whole—he ripped apart, chawed my body to pulp* 

chewed my body to pulp. He set me up as a target; his arrows tore through my flesh. He hacked my liver to pieces; he poured my gall on the ground . . . he demolished my inmost walls

(Job 16:12-14 – Stephen Mitchell translation,

It certainly was so for Job. His discourse with friends, set in stunning poetic form, plunges the reader into a whirlpool of torment, raising disturbing questions about God's way and humanity's place in creation. Job not only unnerved his friends and raised their moral ire, but continues today to disturb any comfortable notions about God and the moral life.
