


Please mark your calendars!! We will be hosting a **Spring** Rummage Sale on Saturday, May 4, in the church hall.

But first, we need your help! We will be accepting donations of the following items:





Prompts for Reflection

The book of Job is one of the greatest poems in world literature. It is at once a terrifying and inspiring story, thousands of years old. It's original may be the oldest piece of writing in the bible. Older, even, that the Pentateuch. As it is part of the bible, it is also for us - sacred text. NA

Though written in Hebrew, its hero, or anti-hero, is a gentile. However foreign its hero, he voices a perennial Jewish theme—the theme of the victim. "Someone must have slandered Job, because one morning he was arrested, even though he had done nothing wrong." That is what makes Job, the central parable of our post-Holocaust age, and gives such urgency to its deep spiritual power."
