# **Resource Management Committee Report**

The Resource Management Committee welcomed Tom Scott in March. At our April meeting, we said goodbye to the Rev. Dr. Nick Athanasiadis.

The name of the daycare centre on the second floor is Talented Tinkers Childcare Centre. We met with the owners, Nuzhat Sami, Basit Sami and Hafsa Sami this week, along with Derek Sardo and Bryan Doyle of Rolling Thunder, to determine their security needs. Cameras and an intercom system will be installed upstairs. Talented Tinkers will use the kitchen in the Hub for their lunch preparation, and the children will eat in the Hub. A washer and dryer are to be installed. Their internet and telephone have been installed upstairs. The owners plan to come in on Victoria Day weekend to paint upstairs. They will enroll 5 children shortly. Their plan is to begin building the outdoor play area, on the north side of the church, soon.

The installation of the air conditioning units for the nursery, the Allan Room, the Vestry and the bookkeeper's office have been approved. Bosanac Heating & Electric Ltd. will install the units. We raised over \$27,000 through an appeal, and the Trustees have committed to the rest of the money. Work begins on May 12.

Rentals continue to be a good source of revenue for Central. In April and May, we welcomed the CBC cast and crew of "YYZ" for their lunches. Hamilton Sings has finished another year of rehearsals in the Fellowship Hall on Saturdays but will return in the fall. Building Blocks Speech Therapy has renewed its agreement for another year, using the basement classrooms four days a week. The Durand Market starts on Wednesday, May 28<sup>th</sup> and ends on October 29<sup>th</sup>. Six vendors have committed to the market.

We have completed some upgrades to our internet and security system. Our very old modems have been replaced with new ones that allow us to take advantage of the faster internet speed that Cogeco, our service provider, offers. We have installed two new cameras. One is in the indoor ramp behind the stage, and the other is on the southeast corner of the building, allowing a view of the front of the church and the parking lot in the alley. Talented Tinkers Childcare is installing two cameras on the north side of the building, so we have a good view of most of the outside of the church. A grant from the Ontario government is paying for these upgrades.

The building across the alleyway, which housed Grace Haven, has been sold. The new owner is converting it to apartments. His parking spaces in the alleyway are now off-limits to Central Church. He has posted the

fence with "No Parking" signs. These spaces are for tenants and workmen.

We have increased custodian hours to 30 hours a week now. With the increasing number of rentals, David needs more time to keep our building clean. David is monitoring our security system and will come to the church in the event of an alarm. We have had three alarms in the last couple of months from the opening of the south door of the chapel. We have asked that no one use that door except as an exit in an emergency, as the door is difficult to lock. When it is not locked, it tends to swing open.

This month, we are reviewing fire procedures and will be revising the procedures and the notices. We hope to rehearse a fire drill with the congregation and the Faith Finders children.

The 2025 Budget approved at the Congregational meeting had expenses greater than revenues in the amount of \$136,858, and the Trustees have provided temporary funding (over the amounts they had previously committed) by diverting funds normally accumulated for major repairs to the building.

# Pastoral Care Update from Rev. Lois Whitwell

As most of you know I live in the rural area of Hamilton, Binbrook to be exact. Spring has arrived. The tulips and daffodils are blooming in the flower beds; the lawn is covered in dandelions. We don't spray them here on the farm, we have bee hives. The bees feed on the nectar of not only the flowers in the garden but the bright yellow dandelions. The farmers are starting to work the soil in preparation for sowing this year's crops. In what seems like a mere breath we have moved from bleak winter to sunny spring. We put away the heavy winter coats and found our summer clothes. We are looking forward to warm weather and many have opened cottages and uncovered their pools. We are already planning summer BBQ's, picnics and trips to interesting places. We are transitioning from one season to another. It is something we do every year.

We are good at this seasonal transition, winter to spring, spring to summer, summer to fall and back to winter. But we find the other transitions in our lives a little harder. Moving from grade 8 to 9, working to retirement, one lifestyle to another can be scary. We long for some things to stay the same. Growing up in the village of Binbrook, things were always the same. The same buildings, the churches in the same place, our house opposite the Baptist Church with the maple trees. I moved around the province, but I always knew that Binbrook and the house where I grew up were waiting for me. But then everything began to change. The contractors started to move in, and houses began to be built. The old familiar buildings torn down to make way for Shoppers Drug Mart, plazas with Freshco and Subway's. There is a Tim Hortons where Armstrongs Feed Store used to be. This transition from a small village to a larger more urban community has been a

challenge, everything is different. But those of us who grew up here or who have lived here for a long time are getting used to it. We like Tim's and restaurants. We like the fact that Armstrongs is now a thriving Home Hardware and Garden Center. We like the drug stores and Walk in Clinic with doctors, the dentists and other services that have moved into the community. We do not have to drive into the city any more to do our shopping. We have gotten used to the traffic circles and the stop lights. But it is different, and different isn't a bad thing.

In all aspects of our lives, we are facing new challenges and times of transition. But as we move through our lives we are assured that God is with us as individuals and as a congregation. I thought for the summer months, I would have Office Hours at the church Thursdays 9:30 – noon. I will have the coffee pot on and maybe some goodies. People can come for a talk, and maybe a time for prayer.

Clerks serving 43 presbyteries and eight synods across Canada attended the Clerks' Consultation last week (April 29-May 1). The consultation, which usually takes place every two years, gives the clerks the possibility to make contacts, build supportive relationships, and exchange ideas. Presentations on polity and policies help inform the clerks and create a space for conversations that can test and reshape the material offered. The focus is on resourcing clerks to do their work confidently and effectively. The clerks represent a wide range of experience. Attending this year's gathering at the Queen of Apostles Renewal Centre in Mississauga was a clergy clerk who had served their presbytery since 1971, and a layperson clerk appointed only a month before the consultation.

# View from the Organ from Dr. Marcus Scholtes

I don't even know where to start with all the goings-on in the Music Ministry at Central! The last few months have been completely packed; I shall start with the most recent highlights: Passion Week and Easter. This is always a particularly busy time of year, we had a beautiful Maundy Thursday evening service in which the choir excelled, performing the traditional 'Trisagion", which was followed by a powerful Good Friday morning service. I would like to give a shout-out to Lois for leading the GF service, which was particularly poignant, both in scripture and in music.

Good Friday was also significant for our evening concert, which featured Mozart's passionate and famous Requiem in D Minor, K. 626. This is truly an incredible composition, and masterwork of Western music. We were delighted to be joined by choristers from around Hamilton and Ancaster, our choir consisted of 42 members! We were also fortunate to have the Sound Linc Chamber Ensemble to add to the experience, with Ken and Steve on basset horns to give an authentic



'performance practice' sound and timbre, akin to what the audiences in the 18th century would have heard. A special mention goes out to our soloists for this event, who not only sang the solo quartet parts, but also sang all the choral parts: Emma Reilly McKay, Katie Weresch, Brian Power, and Michael Davis, Bravo! Just like our December Candlelight Carol Service, we again had an audience of over 500 people. I'm so happy to share the joy of music, not only of the music itself, but that we are sharing high-quality music at Central to our community in Hamilton. We are truly blessed that we are coming together to perform at this level. I am humbled and thankful to all the choristers and musicians that made the Good Friday event such a success.



Our Music@Central series has continued to attract many new faces. Since the last Contact Newsletter in February, we've had two more incredible recitals. On March 2nd Stephan Sylvestre performed a virtuosic solo piano program, with works by Bach, Schumann, Chopin, Debussy, and Elbeniz. Stephan is Associate Professor of Piano at the Don Wright Faculty of Music at the University of Western in London, and he lives in Ancaster! He is an extremely talented tour-de-force, and I'm sure he'll return to our series in the future.

The final concert in the 2024-2025 season of M@C featured two extremely talented flautists, Caroleen Molenaar and Madison Deppe. This was a very fun program, and a great



most beloved flute duo repertoire, and I had the pleasure of accompanying them from the piano. We also have a special guest on this program (our very own Sara Traficante!) and the three of them performed the Grand Trio Op. 90 by Friedrich Kuhlau.

At the time of writing this article, the 2025-2026 Music@Central series is almost finalized, there's one date I'm still trying to confirm. But we have an awesome line up for next year: HPO musicians for the first concert, Bud Roach and friends, Duo Thalia, Jonathan Oldengarm - superstar organist will perform alongside our own Charlton String Quartet, Bethany Hörst from UWO will sing a duo program, and the final concert will feature Ben Smith and myself performing virtuosic violin and piano sonatas. It's an extremely ambitious 3rd season, and I can't wait to showcase all these talented musicians that will be performing in our sanctuary.

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One more highlight to share is the addition of a new choir member! Debbie Szabo came to sing for the Mozart Requiem, and had such a great time that she is now attending regularly on Thursdays and Sundays. She is a long time acquaintance of Michael Davis, was a soloist at Chedoke Church and also sang with Opera Hamilton for many years. Welcome Debbie!

I would like to share one item as well: for those of you that don't know, Sharon and I have been "commuting" to New York City almost every week since September! This was our professional development project year: we both received grants from the Canada Council for the Arts, as well as the Ontario Arts Council to study conducting with a professor

(Mark Shapiro) at Juilliard. So every Wednesday (or as many as we could attend) we drove to NYC to attend the evening class, and would return on Thursday, in time for me to lead choir rehearsal. This has been an incredible year of growth and learning, with many new skills that I can now bring to Central. We are both so incredibly thankful to the arts councils to be given this opportunity.



Finally, I would like to share a tribute to our out-going Interim Pastor, Dr. Nick Athanasiadis. His steadfast leadership of the last few years has provided us a strong foundation upon which to build. He had an ongoing and glowing appreciation of Central's Music

Ministry, our talented choir, and the level at which we perform, as well as the diverse programming of anthems of various eras and genres. From all of us in the Music Ministry, we wish Dr. Nick a happy and fulfilling retirement!

And now onwards to summer! The choir's last Sunday will officially be June 22nd, and then we'll have a wonderful line up of soloists to lead our summer worship services. See you soon!



# A Special Memory

The recent celebrations of the end of the Second World War brought back a special memory. Thirtyfive years ago, in May of 1990, I came into the Church Office and found a note from Jean Walker, the Church Secretary, to say that Mrs Gaasenbeek was going to bring in "a poem about the liberation of Holland 45 years ago". With a request that it be printed in the Sunday bulletin!

But it was more than just a poem. Barbara Gaasenbeek, then a fairly recent member of our congregation, had written it twenty years before, in 1970. She had entered it in a national CBC competition, and she had won. That poetic competition was part of a wonderful expression of gratitude.

"To honour their chosen country for its sacrifices in the liberation of The Netherlands in 1945, Dutch Canadians throughout Canada have raised funds for a national gift of pipe organs to be permanently installed in the National Arts Centre."

There was a "Commemoration Concert and Presentation of National Gift" on May 17, 1970. The smaller 400 pipe organ had been installed already. A large concert organ with 1500 pipes was yet to come.

Instead of just printing Barbara's poem in the next Sunday Bulletin, it was sung as an Anthem at the Annual Church Parade of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada a week later. The Argylls had lost hundreds of lives as they battled their way through the Netherlands on the way to the defeat of Hitler's Germany. So there was special meaning for the Regiment that Sunday.

It was spring in nineteen forty five, In starving Netherlands. In suffering and hopeless strife We prayed: "God free our hands". Canadians, they came to save And for our lives their lives they gave.

Canadian graves in Holland lay: This sacrifice will be A debt we only can repay With love and loyalty. Together going hand in hand, We build the future of this land.

The Dutch in Canada, they feel A bond that's strong and true, Proud of their heritage, they seal The old into the new: Our Canada, so young and free. God give us peace and unity.


Why particularly mention him now? Because Richard Heath Rohmer was born in Hamilton, in 1924. AND was baptized in our very own in Central Presbyterian Church.
